

Literacy

Monday	<p>Read the story 'The Cautious Caterpillar' and answer the questions.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Talk about what this story might mean for you moving up to KS2. Is there any advice you can take from this story?</i></p>
Tuesday	<p>Fill in the 'All About Me' bunting. Decorate it and colour it in. Then keep hold of it until your first day in Year 3 for a display! Make sure your words are spelt correctly and in neat handwriting because your new teacher will see this!</p>
Wednesday	<p>Complete the sheet 'moving on up'. This is a discussion activity to ease anxiety for transition this year. If you feel you would like to do some writing to go with it, feel free.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Can you write a letter to a child moving up to Year 2? What advice would you give them?</i></p>
Thursday	<p>Today you need to use the sheet 'Year 1 and 2 Common Exception Words'. All children are expected to be able to read and write these before moving to KS2. We have been practicing them all year, so now is your chance to go through them all and really practise any that you still don't know.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Write some sentences for the words. How many words can you fit into one sentence?</i></p>
Friday	<p>Write a letter to your new teacher using the 'Dear New Teacher' sheet. The sheet gives you lots of ideas what to write.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Send it to school or take a picture of it and email it. Then your new teacher will see it before the start of Year 3!</i></p>

Maths – revision week

Monday	<p>Complete the 'Odd and even numbers' sheet. Follow the instructions. If you can't remember which are which, there are some great YouTube tutorials on this. (2,4,6,8,0 – even) (1,3,5,7,9 – odd)</p> <p><i>Take it further: Can you write your own divide by two problem like Saira's?</i></p>
Tuesday	<p>Complete the sheet 'Coin Multiplication'. We have learnt before how multiplication can be done both ways round and you still get the same answer. Write both ways down in the box.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Write the repeated addition for each. (E.g. <math>4 \times 2</math> is the same as <math>2+2+2+2</math> or <math>4+4</math>)</i></p>
Wednesday	<p>Complete the sheet 'Adding 3 Numbers Challenge'. You need to add these numbers in your head without writing any jottings down or using any equipment.</p>
Thursday	<p>Use the sheet 'Bar Models' and complete it. Help is provided at the top of the sheet.</p> <p><i>Take it further: Can you make a bar model pyramid? Start with 6 boxes on the bottom with the numbers 1,2,3,4,5 and 6 inside them. Then keep adding them up to the top. What did you get?</i></p>
Friday	<p>Complete the sheet 'KS1 Block Adventurer' to test your times table knowledge. I know you love these colouring sheets in Year 2!</p> <p><i>Take it further: Make your own colouring for a family member by drawing your own grid and putting in your own questions.</i></p>

There are also a few 'fun' activities, feel free to do them.

The Year 2 spelling list is to practice a few words a day, alongside English, Maths and Reading.
