Maths	Draw around your own foot. Can you measure how big your foot is using counters, bricks or cubes.	The beanstalk was very tall! Can you find 5 things that are taller than you and 5 things that are shorter. Perhaps you could record your findings.	Use your imagination to make a giant beanstalk using a range of materials such as paper, straws, tubes. How can you stick your beanstalk together? Is your beanstalk taller or shorter than you?	Can you work out these addition sums? Read the sum and use counters to help you. $2+2=$ $5+3=$ $3+4=$ $6+4=$ $9+1=$	Can you write numbers to 10? (There is a number formation sheet with rhymes on the website to help you). Can you write numbers to 10 in the correct order?

Topic Ideas	<p>Can you make some puppets to tell the story of 'Jack and The Beanstalk?'. You could use different materials such as straws or lollypop sticks.</p>	<p>Choose your favourite type of construction. Can you make the giants castle? Maybe you could use your castle to tell the story?</p>	<p>The magic bean grew into a beanstalk when it was planted in Jacks garden. Ask a grown-up if you can plant some seeds in a pot. How could you take care of your seed and help it to grow?</p>	<p>Enjoy an episode of 'Get Squiggling'.
